Leopold's Land Ethic


"A thing is right when it tends to preserve the integrity, stability, and beauty of the biotic community. It is wrong if it tends otherwise" (46)



Evolution


- The Process of Gradual Change
- In The Origin of Species, Darwin defines Natural Selection as the "... preservation of favorable variations and the rejection of injurious variations..." (112)
- Heredity, the passing on of characteristics from

parents to offspring



Individual Rights of Sentient Beings

- A sentient being is any living creature that can feel
- All sentient beings have some natural rights, though it may vary
- Because of this understanding, humans have the responsibility to respect the autonomy of other sentient beings



Conclusion

- The best approach is to leave nature and biotic communities to their own devices
- However, humans are a part of the biotic community and our actions have an effect
- Our perception of perfection is an intangible human construct
- Things that are further from our influence are more valuable (i.e. Cow vs. Snow leopard)
