Northern Virginia Conservation Trust What We Do

- Work with private landowners and local governments to conserve and care for our natural and historic treasures
- Protect and defend over 7,000 acres in Northern Virginia
- Hold 110 conservation easements and own 21 small nature preserves in both urban and rural areas
- Steward lands ranging in size from half an acre to 400 acres
- Engage the community with trash clean ups, invasive pulls, outdoor activities, and educational opportunities
- Advocate for appropriate land use and conservation policy






How the Trust Helps the Community Conserve Land — *Forever*

Our primary tool is the conservation easement

- Legally binding, flexible tool to conserve land and its features
- Land protected remains in private ownership and can be sold or passed on to heirs
- Federal and state tax law provide benefits to most landowners who conserve property
- Easements can be amended but not rescinded







Potential Financial Benefits to the Landowner

Placing a conservation easement with the Northern Virginia Conservation Trust is considered a charitable donation. Landowners may be eligible for:

- Federal income tax deduction
- Virginia income tax credit
- Federal estate tax exclusion
- Possible local real estate tax reduction




Overall Benefits of Conservation to the Landowner



- Permanently protect the land you love
- Retain the right to own and operate the property
- Extract some of the land's cash value now without having to sell the property
- Maintain the ability to sell the property later (subject to easement restrictions)
- Assist in estate planning
- Ability to take direct action that can benefit the entire community
